Because the blood of Jesus cleanses us from all our sins, we are holy, just as Jesus is holy, free to live a life of holiness and good works in service to God and one another.

I have many more positive things I could say about the conference, but my time and space are limited. So, I will conclude my letter on this note: Thank you to Matthew and Laura for their tireless, sacrificial service on behalf of our youth and congregation. Our participation in the conference would not have been possible without them. Thank you also to our youth for attending, as well as to their parents and families for allowing them to do so. I enjoyed spending the week with these young, faithful servants of God. They have a deep love for the Lord, His Word, and His Church. YOUTH HIGHER THINGS RECAP

Pastor Crane, Matthew and Laura Olson, and eight youth from Grace attended the Higher Things conference from July 2-6 at Carleton College in Northfield, MN. We were blessed with several milestones for this trip. This was the largest group and most youth we have ever been able to take to a Higher Things conference. And this was the first time we had our pastor attend the conference with us.

We traveled together in a 12-person van to and from the conference. The trip took a long time, but we were thankful to be able to travel together. We stopped at Grandad Bluff in La Crosse for lunch on the way to the conference and took in the beautiful views of the surrounding area.

We ate meals together and played games in our time before the conference started with the opening service. The chapel at Carleton sounded wonderful with more than 600 youth, adult leaders, and pastors singing hymns. All week we were blessed with great sermons on the subject of "Sanctified," the theme of this year's conference.

Each day we also attended a Plenary Session, which was an hour-long study led by Pastor George Borghardt and Pastor Donovan Riley. It was wonderful to see hundreds of youth so engaged in study of God's Word.

"They both had amazing sessions that kept me interested even when I was super-tired," one of our youths said.

There were six sessions of classes offered with a very wide variety of topics to choose from. Our youth attended classes that discussed the Lutheran view of dating, exorcism, the use of Facebook, the relationship between Christianity and science, looking at end-times prophecies through the lens of Marvel movies, and vocations.

"I thought Pastor Borghardt's class on vocations was very informative and eye-opening," a youth said.

A highlight for this conference was being able to attend a class taught by our own pastor! All of our group attended Pastor Crane's class on looking at the significance of several numbers that are used frequently in the Bible. More than 80 people, mostly youth, crammed into a classroom to hear Pastor Crane and another 30 people had to be turned away because the room was too full!

"Pastor Crane's class was a huge success! It was obvious he took a lot of time to prepare for his class and I was so proud of him," one of our youth said.

Another blessing of having Pastor Crane with us was being able to do Compline together, which is an end of the evening service of prayer, singing, and Bible readings. We had never been able to do this service on our own before.

The night time also offered opportunities for fellowship and fun. We played cards with our group, petted some exotic animals, got free shaved ice for our group winning a challenge, and attended a chant-off where one of our youths participated.

We got back to Grace very late on July 6th, but thankfully we returned home safely.

We thank you for your very generous support of our youth. Without your donations, we would never be able to have these kinds of wonderful opportunities and experiences. And if you want to know anything else about this conference, we strongly encourage you to talk to our youths!

FROM THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

"For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Gal. 5:1).

Christ died to set us free from our sinful desires. In Holy Baptism, our Old Adam is drowned and put to death along with all sin and evil desires so that a new man may arise and live before God in righteousness and purity.

In Christ, we are a new creation. We are set free from the passions of the flesh so that we are free to do our duty and bear fruits of the Spirit.

Our duty is what God calls us to do as members of a family, society, and the church.

God calls us to believe in His Word and gladly hear and learn it. He calls us to pray for all people. He calls us to live in faith toward Him and in fervent love for our neighbor. He calls us to put the gifts He gives to us in His service. God calls parents to provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord. And God calls children to honor their parents and provide and care for them when they are no longer able to do so themselves.

God calls the government to punish those who do evil and to reward those who do good. He calls citizens to pay their taxes and honor the governing officials as God's servants. He calls pastors to preach and teach the Gospel as well as repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And He calls hearers to support those who teach them with every good thing.

Christ died to set us free from the works of our selfish flesh, giving us the freedom and liberty to do our duty. Stand firm, then, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

July 2018 Missions Update on the Mahlburgs in Sri Lanka

Rev. Steven and Martha Mahlburg, along with their 5 children, are in their second year of missionary service in Sri Lanka.

Rev. Mahlburg works with the LCMS church partner in Sri Lanka, visiting all the active congregations and mission stations in the Ceylon Evangelical Lutheran Church. There are over a dozen of them, and this past June marked a milestone of his visiting the last one. He plans to continue these visits to build up and encourage these folks with the Word of Christ.

Rev. Mahlburg writes, "I was asked to teach an English language Bible class for the youth in the upcountry. I was eager to do this. The class has been a real blessing for me. I enjoy connecting with the youth and look forward to building lasting relationships with them. Most important, I pray that their faith will be strengthened and their relation with Jesus. The youth are eager to learn about the Bible and do far better with English than I am with Tamil. Whether I am teaching children in English or training pastors or encouraging parishioners or telling a taxi driver about Jesus, this is all God's work. I am thankful and humbled that God would entrust us with participating in His work here in Sri Lanka. Thank you for partnering with us by your prayers and support."

In family news Martha writes, "We took a trip to visit some cultural sites in Sri Lanka. We visited the cave temples at Dambulla, the ancient ruins at Anuradhapura, and ruins of the ancient fortress at Sigiriya. Liberty and Skye competed in a school drama competition. We also celebrated Skye's 15th birthday."


