**“Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.” (Isaiah 41:10 ESV)**

Dear Friends in Christ:

As you know, the Wisconsin Supreme Court overturned the statewide “Safer at Home” order on Wednesday, May 13. That same evening, the City of Racine Public Health Department issued its own “Safer at Home” order to replace it. It closely resembles the state’s order, except that it removes the previously imposed nine-person limit on attendance at church worship services. Under the city’s order, worship attendance is now limited to 25 percent of our seating capacity, and we must practice social distancing as much as possible. I confirmed this information with a representative of the city’s public health department on Friday, May 15.

On Friday and Saturday, May 15 and 16, I worked closely with our Head Elder, Matthew Olson, to draft interim guidelines that are in compliance with the city’s order to allow us to resume regular in-person worship services on Sunday, May 17. These interim guidelines are as follows:

- We can resume in-person worship services at 25 percent of our seating capacity.
  - Conservatively, our nave can hold about 300 people, so 25 percent of that is 75. Since we will be starting our summer worship schedule on Thursday, May 28 (Thursdays at 6:30 pm and Sundays at 9:00 am), I do not think we will exceed the 75-person limit at any one service.
- Social distancing (six-foot distance between people, except for members of the same family) will be followed as much as possible.
  - Please keep your distance as best you can from other people.
  - Some rows of pews will be blocked off.
- Masks may be worn in church, but they are not required.
- I will wash my hands and use hand sanitizer before distributing Holy Communion. Hand sanitizer will also be available on stands near the trays for the used Communion cups for those who wish to use it.
- For the time being, only individual cups of Communion wine will be offered. The cups will be spaced throughout the trays to reduce the risk of touching another cup besides your own.
- Please keep some distance from others while at the Communion rail (families can remain together). Also, please remain standing so as not to touch the rail and possibly contaminate it.
- The children will not come forward for Catechism Time.
- The offering plates will be located at the back of the nave.
- The Fellowship Pads will not be completed at this time.
- I will stand at the back of the church to greet people after the service; however, please try to follow social distancing as much as possible when leaving. We cannot congregate at the entrances or exits. If you want to bypass me and leave the church by another way, I will not be offended.

I do not intend all of these to become permanent measures or practices at church. We will make changes to them, as necessary. The city's order currently expires on Tuesday, May 26, and we do not yet know if it will be extended or how it might be changed. My hope is that as the situation with the coronavirus pandemic improves, we can return to our regular worship practices, including offering the common cup and kneeling for Holy Communion. These two customs are very important to me personally, and I have no intention of eliminating them permanently.

Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions, suggestions, or concerns. Thank you again for your prayers, understanding, and support of our congregation during this difficult time. I rejoice that we can resume our regular in-person worship services again, even as I pray for an end to this coronavirus pandemic. May God bless you and your families, and may He keep us all safe and healthy.

Finally, I want to leave you with these thoughts that I shared in my sermon on Sunday, May 17. As we leave our homes to gather in Christ's church to worship Him, especially at this time, we are giving a bold confession of our faith in Him to the world, to our neighbors, and to our children. Yes, we should and will take reasonable precautions to try to keep ourselves and others safer from the virus, including here at church. Yes, we should consider the advice of our leaders, doctors, and health care authorities when it comes to resuming a more normal life once again. Each of us will have to decide when we think it is safe enough to come to church, knowing that it will never be 100 percent safe. Life is always filled with risk. But, my friends, regardless of what you decide to do in the days and weeks ahead when it comes to church or anything else, please do not live in fear. For example, please do not allow watching worship services on Facebook to become a permanent substitute, unless you have no other choice, for gathering with your brothers and sisters in Christ to worship Him and to receive His life-giving body and blood in Holy Communion.

Quite simply, fear comes not from God, but from the devil. As the Bible says, "God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control" (2 Timothy 1:7 ESV). So, confess whatever fears you have to Him and live in the forgiveness and peace Jesus died fearlessly to give to you. Jesus says in Luke, "Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? And not one of them is forgotten before God. Why, even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not; you are of more value than many sparrows" (Luke 12:6-7 ESV). Yes, my friends, you are of infinite value to God, for Jesus purchased you with the blood of His nail-scarred hands. As He promises you in Isaiah, "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41:10 ESV).

### **FROM THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP**

The sin of the world is paid for. God's Law has been kept perfectly on our behalf. The prophecies have all been fulfilled. Jesus Christ has finished it all! And that, dear Christians, should fill us with complete confidence in our salvation. Since Jesus has finished all these things in His self-sacrifice, we can be fully certain our sins are forgiven, and we have everlasting life!

St. Paul wrote: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (Rom. 12:1)

We hear the same teaching in 1 Peter. "As you come to him, a living stone, rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves, like living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:4-5)

It's the very thing Malachi foretold of the Lord, that He would come and purify His priestly people, that they may offer to Him an offering in righteousness. (Mal. 3:3)

So, what does this mean? In view of God's mercies – that is, because Jesus sacrificed Himself to make us pure, giving His entire self into death – Paul said that we are to sacrifice ourselves entirely to God, offering Him our whole lives. For our Savior did not give Himself for us in part. So, we do not give back to Him in part.

We don't offer ourselves to God just on Sunday mornings or Wednesday evenings, for example. Rather, we give Him our whole selves, all the time. We understand that offering ourselves to God as living sacrifices involves the giving of our time. It requires us to be faithful stewards of the time He has given us. Yes, it means we devote to our Savior all our time. Otherwise we are not sacrificing our whole lives.

You see, God both teaches us, and has graciously qualified us, to present ourselves to Him as living sacrifices – to live as His holy priests, who offer Him acceptable sacrifices through Jesus Christ, all day, every day, in our various callings.

In the passages from Romans and 1 Peter, we hear several examples of Christian self-sacrifice: serving, teaching, encouraging, giving, leading, showing mercy, living peaceably with others, submitting to governing authorities and those over us in the workplace, wives submitting to husbands, husbands honoring wives, showing compassion, and suffering patiently in doing good.

In all these things, and in all our other everyday activities, we sacrifice ourselves by using our time, not just for our own benefit, but also and especially for the well-being of others. Work time, school time, exercise time, study time, mealtime, chore time, recreation, and relaxation time, even sleep time – it's all God's gift to us to use for purposes that please and honor Him.

This challenges us to think about the way we spend our time, how we utilize our talents, and the way we spend our treasures. Whatever it is I'm doing, am I doing it "for the Lord"? (Col. 3:23) Am I presenting God a living sacrifice? Am I conducting myself as a holy priest, whose sacrifice is acceptable to God?

Because our Lord sacrificed Himself wholly for us, we offer ourselves wholly to Him as living sacrifices. This is following Jesus in self-sacrifice. By His saving mercy, yes, our sacrifice is acceptable to God. For the sake of Jesus' finished work, God is pleased with us.
